On May 15, juniors and seniors at Lake-Lehman High School witnessed a full-scale demonstration of a traffic accident involving a drunk driver and a fatality.

"Dave Hopfer, our industrial arts teacher, organizes this program every two years," said Mary Ann Maxfield, teacher and moderator of the Students Against Destructive Decisions Club at Lake-Lehman. "He is a volunteer firefighter and very involved with emergency management services."

The students were brought to the staged scene one grade at a time. While the seniors were outside, Frank Yanulevius spoke to the juniors in the auditorium about his daughter Sharon who was killed by a drunk driver in 1995.

As the students watched, listening to the growing cacophony of sirens, a police cruiser arrived followed rapidly by ambulances and fire engines. Vehicles and personnel from the Back Mountain Regional Emergency Management Services and Fire Department, Shavertown Fire Department, Lehman Police, continued page 2

Sweet Valley EMS, Eli's Towing and Geisinger Life Flight all participated in the life-like scenario. Lake-Lehman students Cassie Keiper, Tashia Coenen, and Sierra Pall from the Theater Production Club did the make-up for accident victims Kendra Stine, Mike Penny, Ryan Evans and Garret Hopfer. The latter two are Lake Lehman alumni who were in the production two years ago and returned to help this year.

There was a definite sense of reality at the scene as Lehman Police Officer Harold Cain did a field sobriety test and then arrested the "drunk driver" and placed him in the police cruiser.


The staged accident scene involved two vehicles. The driver of a pickup truck was drunk when he slammed into the other vehicle killing its driver. His passenger had to be removed through the truck's windshield on a backboard and was placed in an ambulance for transport to a hospital. The passenger in the other vehicle was removed using the Jaws of Life and was placed in an ambulance and was ultimately put on the Geisinger Life Flight helicopter.

Throughout the whole program, Hopfer explained to the students what the rescuers were doing. "We've got cameras all over them," he said when some students pointed out that the empty beer can evidence was blowing away. "We have to anymore. And, we don't take care of anything else until we know that our patients are taken care of."

One of the many rescue personnel on hand was Back Mountain Regional Chief Christopher Good who took a few minutes to address the students. He wanted to impress upon them what can happen from bad decision-making.

"A lot of us here have children your age and we've seen this happen too often," said Good. "We want to help you and keep you safe. We are making a commitment to helping you kids."

The program occurred two days before Lake Lehman's annual prom. "We are very proactive with our students to try to keep them safe," said Lake - Lehman principal Doug Klopp. "We have this program and we also have the Last Knight Lock In on graduation night." Prom and graduation nights are the two most dangerous nights for high school students when they may make some celebratory mistakes.

All day rain dampens food drive

Even though it poured down rain all day on Saturday, May 11, our dedicated post office letter carriers did their best to pick up all of the donated food that was left at residential mailboxes at Back Mountain homes.

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Etiquette Tip of the Month

Q: The Lake can be stressful on a busy weekend. I remember the first day we launched our new boat. Within the first fifteen minutes we experienced a collision between jet skiers who were jumping our wake. Now that the summer season is here again, will you remind our boating community of the safety rules and etiquette?

A: Whether you're a thrillseeker, fisherman, or just love the peaceful serenity of the water, recreational boating is pure summertime bliss. However, it



only takes one rude maneuver to ruin the fun and enjoyment of this sport. Thoughtfulness and consideration will go a long way toward avoiding conflicts and misunderstandings on the water.

Speed and efficiency is required when launching and docking your watercraft. Load and secure your belongings before your launch so you don't hold up others in the boat ramp line. Then steer your boat away from the ramp and promptly return your vehicle to the parking lot. If you are inexperienced in backing up your trailer, practice beforehand in a parking lot. Enter a mooring area at a slow speed and pay attention to your anchor and mooring lines because a sudden shift in wind could wreck havoc with other vessels. At the marina, don't make others wait for you in the fueling line while you pick up bait or groceries.

Each boat is responsible for its wake and any damage done by it. Disruptive waves can range from annoying bounces to potentially dangerous jolts involving physical injury. Always slow down when overtaking a slower vessel in open water and allow a wide berth. If you are the vessel being overtaken, drop your speed to approximately 4 knots so the overtaking vessel can slow down enough to avoid throwing an uncomfortable wake. Big wakes in crowded spaces are bad news if you happen to cause property damage such as boats banging into one another or knocking someone's grill off their dock.

Sound carries over water. Respect other's peace and quiet by planning social gatherings away from the shore and other boats. Avoid engine modifications that cause excessive noise. If you are practicing a particular technique, do it in a variety of spots as the repetitive noise can be bothersome. Be sensitive to early morning and late night noise in vicinities where homeowners or campers may be sleeping.

Boat owners are not only responsible for the safety of their passengers and other watercraft; they have an obligation to respect the environment. Pollution kills fish, wildlife, contaminates waterways, and detracts from the beauty of the landscape. You can protect wildlife and delicate ecosystems by slowing down close to the shoreline, making sure the water is deep enough for your craft, avoiding fuel spills, throwing trash into appropriate receptacles, never dumping untreated sewage into the water, and avoiding native reeds and grasses when anchoring.

Nautical etiquette is no different from the rules of the road. It has a great deal to do with consideration for others, common sense, and courtesy, but also for safety. Watercraft can easily be taken for toys as their limits are tested and the associated manners seen as stuffy and arbitrary, but proper manners on crowded waters is a true mark of a good mariner. It requires the highest level of respect not only for the elements but for the responsibility a skipper has toward others. And remember, a boater safety course is a precursor if you are new to boating and a refresher course helps to remind you of what you already know.

The Franklin Township Volunteer Fire Co. held an open house on May 5 to show the community their newly renovated community hall. "We have new floors, countertops, stove and cabinets in the kitchen area and new ceiling tiles and fresh paint throughout," said Maureen Oremus, 1st Assistant Fire Chief for Franklin Twp. "Everything is neat, clean and organized. "We're very fortunate that our guys are just jacks-of-all-trades," said Maureen, of the renovation that started immediately after the last scheduled training session in February. "We've basically done everything ourselves and we worked hard to get it all done for the open house. We wanted to show the community

The event featured hot dogs, hamburgers, and ice cream for visitors, a safety video running continuously, coloring and tattoos for children and tours of the Smokehouse.

"The smokehouse mimics a home and we fill it with smoke to demonstrate how to safely get out of a home fire," said Maureen. "We bought it with a grant and a donation from the Back Mountain Policemen's Association."

Annually, the smokehouse pays a visit to Dallas and Wycallis Elementary schools and all children go through the demonstrations. In addition, it goes to both the Luzerne County and Wayne County Fairs.

"It can also be used as a mobile command center because the bleachers can be converted to beds and it has the wiring for communications, water hookups and runs on a generator," said Maureen. "So, if the police have to be on-site somewhere for a length of time, they can use it. That's why the Policemen's Association also pays the insurance for it."

The three artists will work on site on the Thursday, Friday,



Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program Soon Underway

Program vouchers are given to eligible seniors on a first-come, first-served basis

Rep. Karen Boback (R-Columbia/Luzerne/Wyoming) is reminding senior citizens about the Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program, which assists eligible senior citizens in purchasing fresh fruits and vegetables at area farmers markets.

"Agriculture is our top industry in the Commonwealth, and I am pleased we have an initiative that assists older Pennsylvanians in experiencing the health benefits of fresh local produce," said Boback. "The intent of this program is to help senior citizens who are on a fixed income purchase fresh produce, while also helping to promote the many farmers markets we have in our area."

In order to be eligible for the program, an individual must be at least 60 years of age or turn 60 before the end of 2013. Proof of age, income and county residence are required. Income guidelines per household include \$21,257 for a household of one, \$28,694 for a household of two and \$36,131 for a household of three.

Eligible participants will receive four \$5 vouchers, which can be redeemed at participating farm markets and stands. The vouchers can be used to purchase fresh fruits, vegetables and herbs. Processed foods, baked goods, nuts, cider, honey, jam and certain citrus and tropical fruits are not included in the program.

Vouchers are given on a first-come, first-served basis and will be distributed at the following dates, times and locations: Wednesday, June 5, from 9-11 a.m., at the Benton Senior Center, Northern Columbia County Community and Cultural Center, 42 Community Drive. Monday, June 10, from 10 a.m. to noon, at the Dallas Senior Center, 1158 Twin Stacks Drive. Monday, June 24, from 10 a.m. to noon, at the Shickshinny Senior Center, 17 W. Vine St. Thursday, June 27, from 10 a.m. to noon, at the Sweet Valley Church of Christ, 5439 Main Road.





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
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
