The students first addressed shortages for the ICU units within the Lehigh Valley Hospital System, and then looked for another similar project. One of the students responsible for the visors, Dallas native Robert Martin, proposed the idea to his mother, Dallas Kiwanis member Liz Martin. During a conversation with retired RN and fellow Kiwanis member Mary Rodriguez, the need for PPE at Wilkes-Barre General Hospital was discussed. This discussion prompted a second donation of 132 visors to the Kiwanis Club to be assembled and donated locally.

Materials to properly assemble the shields were donated by AMP Global Strategies, of Shavertown. Dallas Kiwanis members facilitated the assembly process under the guidance of Mrs. Rodriguez. Her husband, Alfonso Rodriguez, MD FASN of Adfinitas Health and General Hospital's Executive Committee, enabled the connection between the Dallas Kiwanis and Mark Schiowitz, MD, Chief of Surgery at General Hospital and member of the General Hospital Executive Committee, Louis O'Boyle, DO, Regional Medical Director and Partner of Adfinitas Health and member of the General Hospital Executive committee, and Dale Johns, CEO of the Wilkes-Barre General Hospital Campus of CHS.

The finished face shields were formally donated on Friday, October 9th, appropriately in front of the "Heroes Work Here" sign outside General Hospital.

### \$403,111 in COVID Grant Funds Awarded to First Responder Companies in the 120th Legislative District, Savs Kaufer

As fire, rescue and EMS companies across the Commonwealth continue to perform life-saving services while doing what they can to remain operational, Rep. Aaron Kaufer (R-Luzerne) was happy to announce that first responder companies in the 120th Legislative District received \$403,111 in state grants provided by the Office of the State Fire Commissioner which will go towards reversing the negative impact they sustained by the CO-VID-19 pandemic.

"Our communities depend a lot on our first responders as they are always the first ones on the scene to offer life-saving services and a sense of comfort to those they are assisting," said Kaufer. "Like most of us, this pandemic has really hit our first responder companies hard, as it severely limited their ability to raise money for their facilities as fundraisers are one of their main sources of money. It is relief to know that our area first responders are receiving these funds, as it will allow these companies to continue to recover, rebuild, and keep their doors open to help those in need."

The grant breakdown for each company is as follows: Back Mountain Regional Fire and EMS Inc., \$36,431. Columbian Volunteer Fire Department, \$25,342. Courtdale Volunteer Hose Company, \$22,740. Exeter Hose Company No.1, \$22,877. Harding Fire Company, \$24,247. Hose Company No. 2 of West Wyoming Borough, \$22,740. Kingston Fire Department, \$24,657. Maltby Volunteer Fire Company, \$22,603. Mt. Zion Bicentennial Volunteer Fire Company, \$23,699. Shavertown Fire Department, \$24,247. Swoyersville Hose Company, \$23,151. Trucksville Volunteer Fire and Rescue Association, \$11,094. Volunteer Fire Department of Luzerne, \$22,603. West Wyoming Hose Company No.1, \$34,788. Wyoming Hose Company No.1, \$22,603. Back Mountain Regional Fire & EMS, Inc., \$24,238. Kingston Firemen's Community Ambulance Association, \$15,048.

The purpose of this grant is to provide some much-needed financial assistance to first responders who have found it difficult to keep their operations running due to COVID-19. As stated in Act 26, the money must be used for operational and equipment expenses, or to replace lost revenue due to pandemic restrictions. 



# Letters from WWII---an American family's story

When my father passed away more than a decade ago, we found among his papers, a stack of documents neatly tied together with a blue ribbon. The papers were brown from age, and as they were examined more carefully, they began to tell a story.

The pages were a series of letters and postcards written to my grandfather by my father and his two brothers when they were serving in the Army during World War II. Dad had saved them from my grandfather's belongings, and we had saved them from his. I wish to share their story through excerpts from those letters, not because it is unique to my family, but because it isn't. During that time, hardly a family in America was untouched by the events on the other side of the globe.

The letters tell a story of love of family, faith, sacrifice, longing, loss and laughter. Those who remember those days will recall and understand. Those who are younger will hopefully gain some insight into the sacrifices made by people during that time so that we may enjoy and preserve the freedom we have today. The price for it has already been paid. We owe so much to that generation of Americans who freed people the world over and then came back home to work in our mines, fields and factories and build America to be the great nation that it is today.

The letters were written on paper provided by the military. It was called "V mail" or "Victory Mail." The letters were reduced to one-quarter of their original size to save valuable shipping space on ships and planes for war materials to be transported instead. Back then our soldiers couldn't call home, couldn't send e-mails, or didn't even know how long they would be serving at their posts of duty. Their letters to and from home took several weeks, if not months, to reach their destinations.

By the time WWII began, my grandfather was 77 years old. He lost my grandmother in 1940, and then said good-bye, three different times, to three of his five sons as they left Wilkes-Barre on trains and buses to join the Army. They traveled to far away places such as Belgium, France, England, Germany, New Guinea and the Philippines. One can only imagine how much his heart must have broken as his children began to leave him, one by one, to travel and fight in very distant and dangerous places.

In one of his first letters to my grandfather in 1942, my Uncle George, the oldest son, lamented the fact that his youngest brother Jim, my father, would be leaving soon for Army boot camp. "I hope I can get home on leave before Jimmy goes away," he wrote. "I am sorry he has to go, but I guess there is no choice." My father had enlisted in the Army because he wanted to join his older brothers, and he became a machine gunner on the front lines.

He was only 20 years old.

There was a repeated pattern in all of the letters written to my grandfather by his sons. They didn't want grandpa to worry about them. In March of 1944 Uncle George wrote,

"I am well and in England. I am living in a castle and staying in the lord's guest room. The British people have had a hard time of it here and are very friendly to us." Family legends have relayed that later my father learned that George was staying in a bombed out castle ruins, the sky could be seen through the holes in the roof, but the walls did provide him with some protection from the elements.

George also wrote: "Now more than ever before, mail is important to us, so will you please write as often as you can and give me the news from home?" Later in August of that year George wrote: "Just a few lines to let you know that I am well and hope you are the same. Dad, you said in one of your letters that you heard that I was hurt. I have never been hurt yet. If I were you, I would not believe all you hear over the radio. They will send you a notice if anything happens to me."

In December 1944, my grand-father's heart was broken one more time when the notice did come that his first-born son George had been killed at the Battle of the Bulge. He is buried with more than 100,000 of his comrades in arms at one of the many American military cemeteries located throughout France.

Many of the other letters to my grandfather were written by my

father. In August of 1944, Dad wrote: "I know you worry about us boys in the Army Dad, but don't worry about me. I am in good health and having good luck. It sure will be good to get back home someday to my wife and baby and you. I sure would like to sleep in a clean bed and have some good food." The truth was that my Dad was hit by some shrapnel that had embedded itself in his shoulder leaving a sizable scar. And sometime before he finally came home in December of 1945. Dad had contracted malaria. which seemed to affect him for several years thereafter.

In another letter to my grandfather, Dad wrote: "Louise (my mother) writes to me every day." Sometimes he didn't get mail for weeks, and then he would get a stack of letters. "I put them in date order to read them," he said. "I sure would like to see her and the baby."

Dad left to go over seas after training at Camp Pickett, Virginia and Camp Shelby, Mississippi when my older sister was only a few months old, and he didn't see her again until she was almost three


years old, missing most of her early childhood and missing the memories that were never created.

In a postcard message written in late December 1944, Dad had asked my grandfather again if he had heard from George because my Dad had not. "Be good until we all get home again," Dad wrote. We don't have copies of any of the letters that my grandfather had written to his sons. I don't remember how grandpa finally told Dad that his brother Floyd had been discharged and was home, but his brother George had been killed in action. Throughout his lifetime, Dad spoke often about his brother George and how much he missed him. He said that George was always "the storyteller."

This story is being shared with empathy and sympathy to the thousands of families who have known separation and loss through war, and to the thousands of soldiers, sailors, airmen, coast guardsmen and marines who have come home to a grateful nation. Let us never forget their sacrifices made for our freedom.



# Are you a responsible recycler?



Recycling plays a part in reducing waste in your area. Did you know you are able to recycle right at the Lehman Township Municipal buildings? We take aluminum cans, tin cans, specific plastics, cardboard and paper. We are proud to be able to provide this low-cost service to Lehman Township residents as well as surrounding community members. Permits are just \$25 per year for non-township residents and are available beginning December 1.

The biggest problem with todays recycling is what people are calling "wishful recycling". Wishful recycling is where good intended people send items to be recycled because they believe or hope they are recyclable, but they aren't. This creates an abundance of problems, including higher recycling prices due to added manpower. Simply look on the container to see if it is recyclable, rinse the item and remove the lid/cap before tossing in into the recycling bin. Check with your local recycling center to see what materials they are currently taking (our list is to the left) and abide by those restrictions. When purchasing a product take a look at the packaging – be aware if the packaging is recyclable. If not, look for a product in packaging that is - or at least more "earth friendly" to the environment; compostable for example. Although compostable materials cannot be placed in the recycling, they do break down in a landfill.


